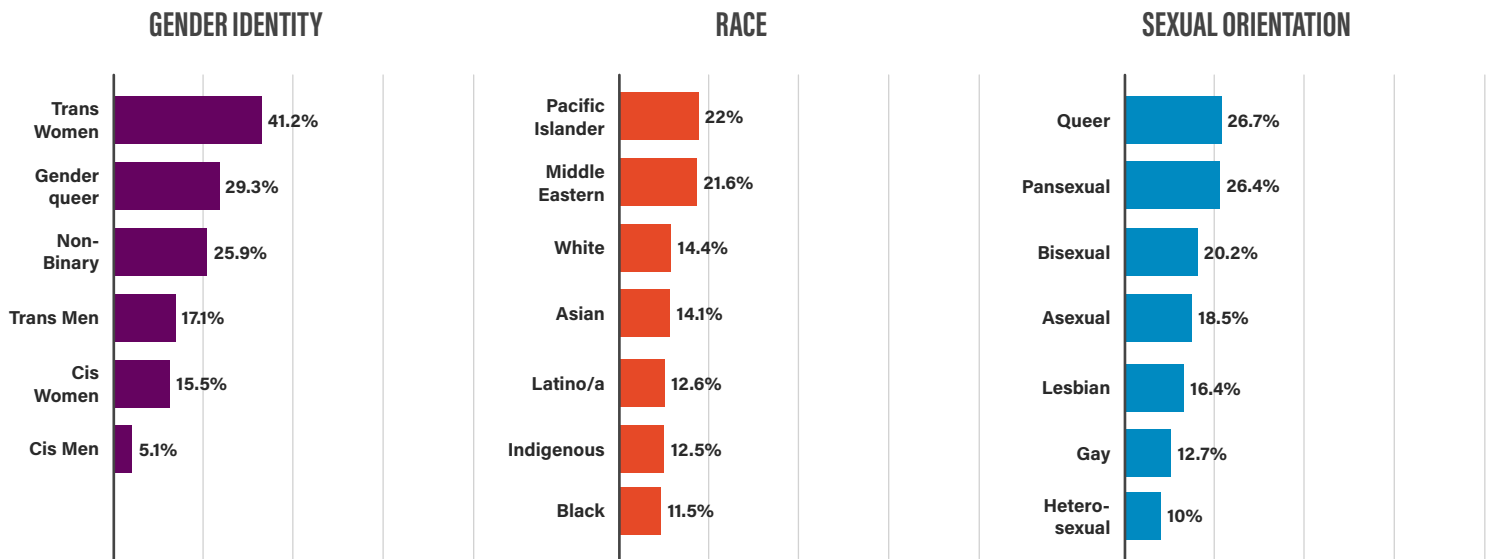




# SEXUAL MISCONDUCT CAMPUS CLIMATE SURVEY RESULTS

## SEXUAL ASSAULT COMPARISONS by race, gender identity, and sexual orientation

Below, the percentage of students who have experienced sexual assault, at least once, is organized by gender, race, and sexual orientation. *Sexual assault* is any unwanted physical contact of a sexual nature.



## CONSENT right

Survey participants indicated how strongly they agreed whether various consent-related practices during sexual encounters were important to them.

*Consent* is a voluntary, non-coerced and mutually understandable communication between adults, meeting the age requirements of the State of Oregon, indicating a willingness to participate in a particular act. Consent must be freely and actively given.

*Respondents check in with their partners throughout a sexual encounter*



### COMMUNICATIVE SEXUALITY

*Respondents have conversations about likes, dislikes, and sexual desires with their partner(s)*

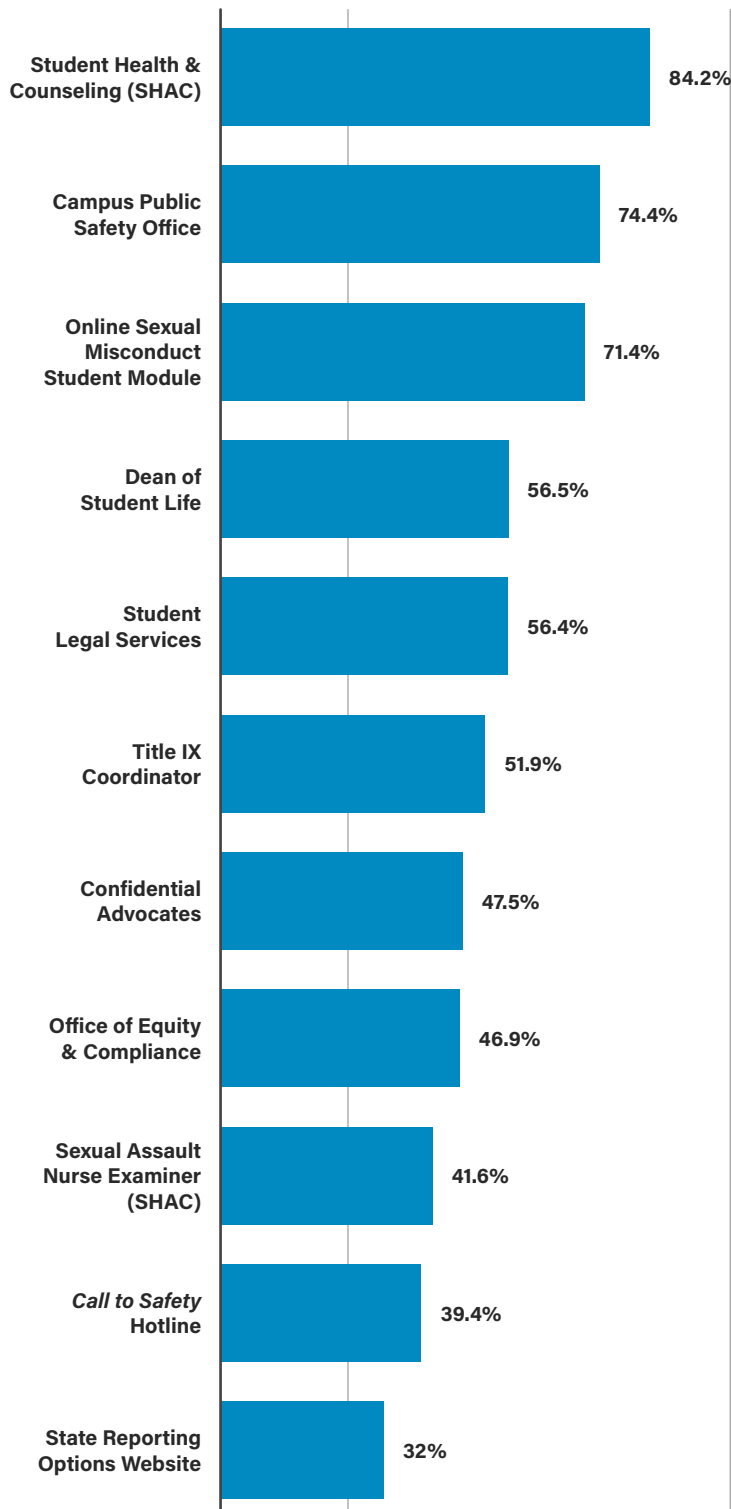

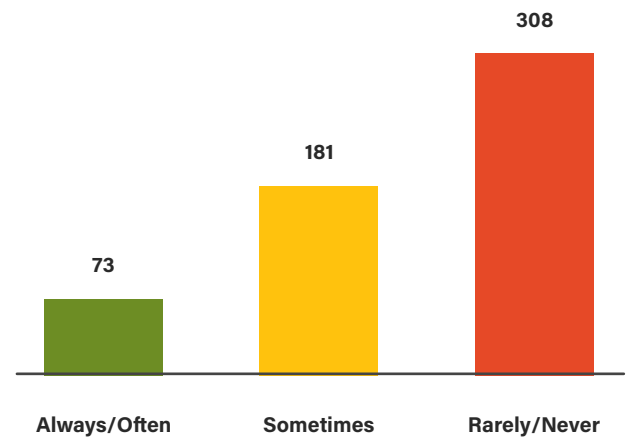

## RESOURCE KNOWLEDGE below

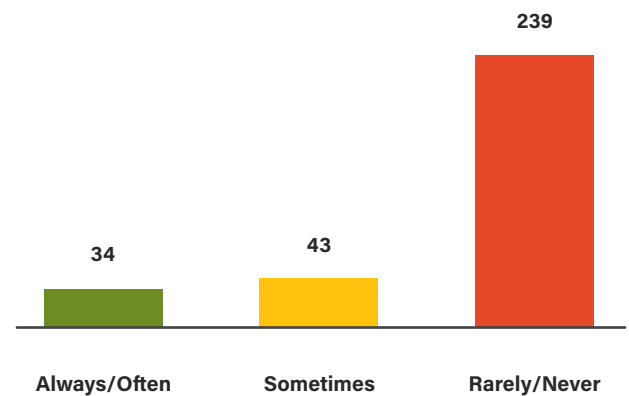

The survey asked respondents to validate how often they acted as proactive bystanders. The most common response to all bystander behaviors is "never," meaning most harmful behaviors go unaddressed when witnessed.
