**Subject:** Updates on COVID-19 and disaster response, housing, and people experiencing homelessness nationwide, June 1-6.

## News<sup>1</sup>

- On the 100th anniversary of Tulsa, OK's Black Wall Street massacre, *Next City* reflects on the neighborhood's second wave of destruction at the hands of the City's 'urban renewal' initiatives. (*Next City*)
- On Thursday, a group of Alabama real estate agents filed an emergency application to the U.S. Supreme Court, asking them to block enforcement of the federal eviction moratorium. (<u>SCOTUSblog</u>)
- 3. Washington D.C. City Council will consider a bill to increase affordable housing availability by offering landlords funding to set aside apartments for households making under 50% Median Family Income (MFI). The Generating Affordability in Neighborhoods bill would set housing targets for each neighborhood, and request proposals from interested landlords. (*Greater Greater Washington*)
- 4. In Portland, Ore., City Commissioner Dan Ryan announced a plan to create six publicly operated and supported camping sites for people experiencing homelessness by the end of 2021. (*OPB*)
- 5. The pandemic has changed King County/Seattle's approach to homelessness by illustrating the crucial relationship between housing and health. (<u>The Denver Channel</u>)
- 6. In New York State, lawmakers are considering two different proposals to facilitate converting offices and hotels into housing. (*Daily News*)
- 7. Meanwhile in New York City, the yearlong legal battle between the houseless men living in the Lucerne Hotel and the City came to an end as a state appeals court rejected the effort to prevent the residents' relocation. At the time of the decision 68 of the original 300 residents remained at the hotel. (*The New York Times*)
- 8. The Austin City Council voted to waive over \$4 million in fees for the Community First! Village, which provides permanent housing for people experiencing chronic homelessness.

The village currently houses over 220 people, and service provider Mobile Loaves & Fishes plans to add 1,400 new tiny homes. (<u>KXAN</u>)

- 9. In Oregon, hotels have provided a vital lifeline for households that lost their homes in wildfires. (*Mother Jones*)
- 10. New research published in Housing Policy Debate estimated the additional cost to provide shelter to every person experiencing unsheltered homelessness at \$4.5 billion. (NLIHC)
