COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This class explores the definition and foundation of environmental justice and the direct application of this concept to both historical and current issues. The goal of the course is to learn the theoretical framework of distributive, procedural, and recognition justice and then apply these learnings to present day scenarios. We will explore a variety of case studies, touching on interrelated topics ranging from climate justice, food justice, energy justice and water justice. This course blends sociological perspectives with natural resource management and policy implications.


ATTENDANCE:


